Youth for Truth

What's Happening: Jessica is telling us about the childhood and youth of Jesus.

esus' burden was to save the souls of men. If He passed by one who was ensnared under Satan's control. He would offer them some word of comfort that would cheer and lift their spirits. If He met another struggling with Satan, He would encourage them to fight on. He would assure a trembling soul that they could not lose the battle with God and the angels on their side. "Those whom He thus helped were convinced that here was One in whom they could trust with perfect confidence."1

Jesus wasn't rich. He didn't live in a beautiful city. He was "the Creator of the worlds, the earth was His possession, and yet poverty marked His life experience at every step." Later in His life, He would say, "The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man

hath not where to lay His head" (Matthew 8:20). He was born in a rude building, one made to shelter animals. Do you know anyone else who was born in a barn? I think not! But by living in poverty His entire life, the Spotless One showed us that happiness does not need a life of ease to thrive. He showed that serving God does not depend on "if I can afford it."

Nazareth, the town where Jesus lived, was well known for its wickedness. Just before becoming a disciple, Nathanael would ask, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" (See John 1:46.) For almost thirty years, Jesus lived in this corrupt environment. And yet, that entire time, He stayed pure and in accordance with God's will. He was "in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15). "He was subject to all the conflicts which

we have to meet, that He might be an example to us in childhood, youth, and manhood."³

Whenever Jesus was tempted, He always had one answer: "It is written." Often His brothers accused Him of being a coward for not joining them in a wrong act. But His response was, "It is written, 'The fear of the Lord, that is wisdom; and to depart from evil is understanding" (Job 28:28). Many times, He was asked, "Why are you so strange and different from us all?" To this He replied, "It is written, 'Blessed are they that keep His testimonies, and that seek Him with the whole heart. They also do no iniquity: they walk in His ways'" (Psalms 119:1-3). What an example for us! What an encouragement to those who are being persecuted for doing right, to know that the King of kings has experienced their very trials!

"Every youth who follows Christ's example of faithfulness and obedience in His lowly home may claim those words spoken of Him by the Father through the Holy Spirit, 'Behold My servant, Whom I uphold: Mine Elect, in whom My soul delighteth' (Isaiah 42:1)."⁴

As we focus on young people who have found the golden vein of true meaning in life, let us learn every ingredient in the recipe for a successful passage through youth. Let's follow Jesus' example as a Youth for Truth!

Our Kitchen to Yours

Jennifer Landis, 20 Minestrone Soup

Serves 10-12

3 Tablespoons olive oil

2 cups diced zucchini

1 cup sliced carrots

1 cup diced celery

1 large onion, diced

3 cloves garlic, minced

3 Tablespoons tomato paste

6 cups vegetable broth

1 (28-ounce) can diced tomatoes (don't drain)

1 (15-ounce) can kidney beans, drained

1 Tablespoon Italian seasoning

2 cups pasta shells

2 cups baby spinach

Salt to taste

In a large pot, sauté zucchini, carrots, celery, onion, and garlic in the oil until the onions are translucent. Reduce heat and stir in the tomato paste. Deglaze with the vegetable broth. Add the tomatoes, beans, and Italian seasoning. Bring to a low simmer and stir in pasta and spinach. Let simmer until pasta is cooked. Add salt to taste. Enjoy!
